Care & Maintenance

- ⊘  ● Not for commercial use. For residential use only.
- ✓  ● Furniture may scratch floors. We recommend using furniture pads to protect your floors.
- ⊘  ● Do not put hot items directly on furniture surface.
- ⊘  ● Do not clean furniture with harsh cleansers or polish.
- ⊘  ● Do not place furniture under direct sunlight.
- ⊘  ● Do not place furniture near heating or cooling vents.
- ⊘  ● Do not write on furniture without a padded barrier to protect the surface.
- ⊘  ● Do not place furniture outside . For indoor use only.
- ⊘  ● Stains may be removed with mild soap solution and damp cloth.
- ⊘  ● Children should not climb or jump on the furniture.



- Dust and pick-up spills using a clean, non-colored, lint-free cloth.

Please look in carton for hardware packs and legs.
Sets often ship in multiple boxes and may arrive a day or two apart.

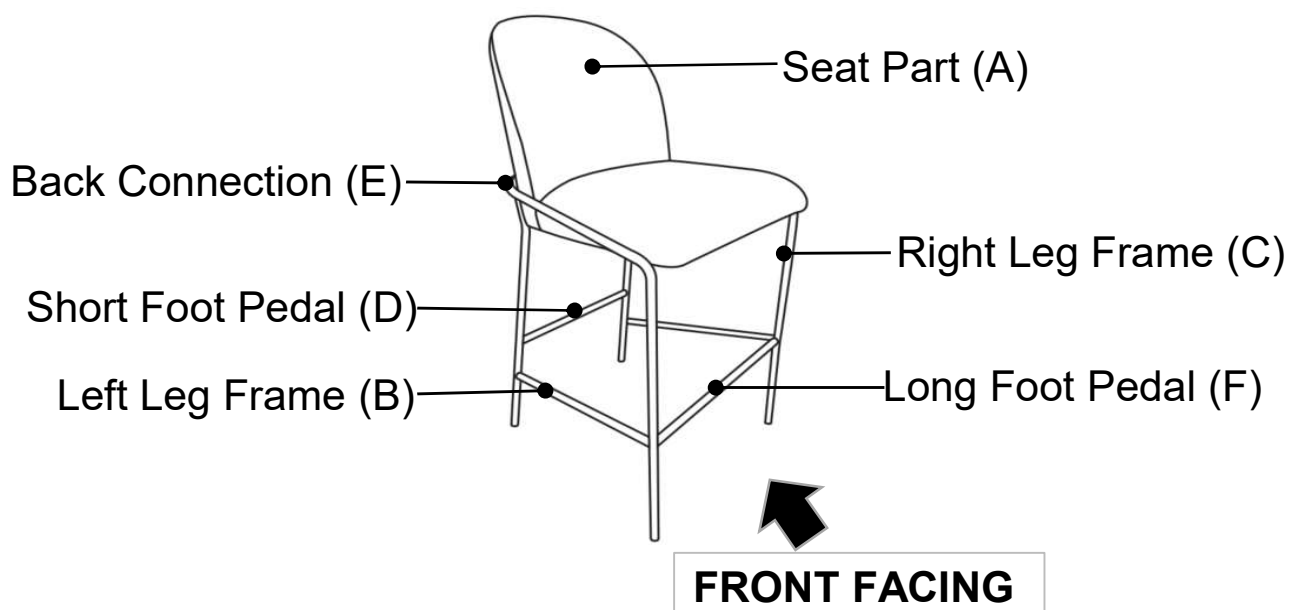

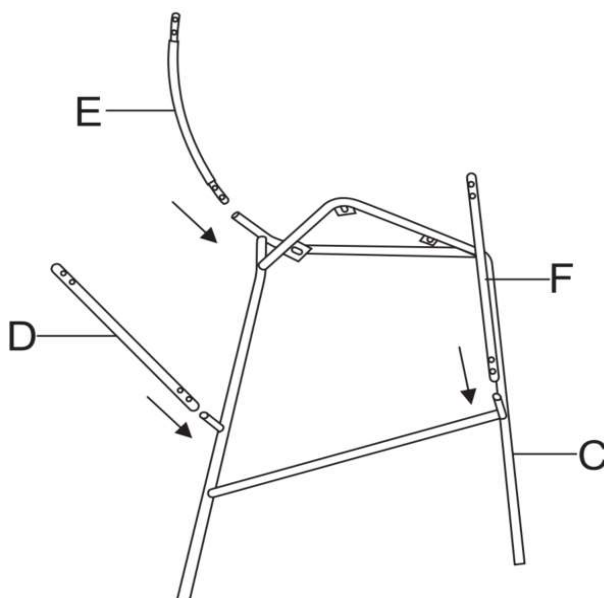
Assembly Steps

Overview



This Bar Stool has multiple parts and may require up to 30 minutes to assemble. To give you an overview of the Bar Stool parts, the above picture is to help you put the various parts into perspective. Please read through the instructions below to familiarise yourself with the parts and steps before assembly.

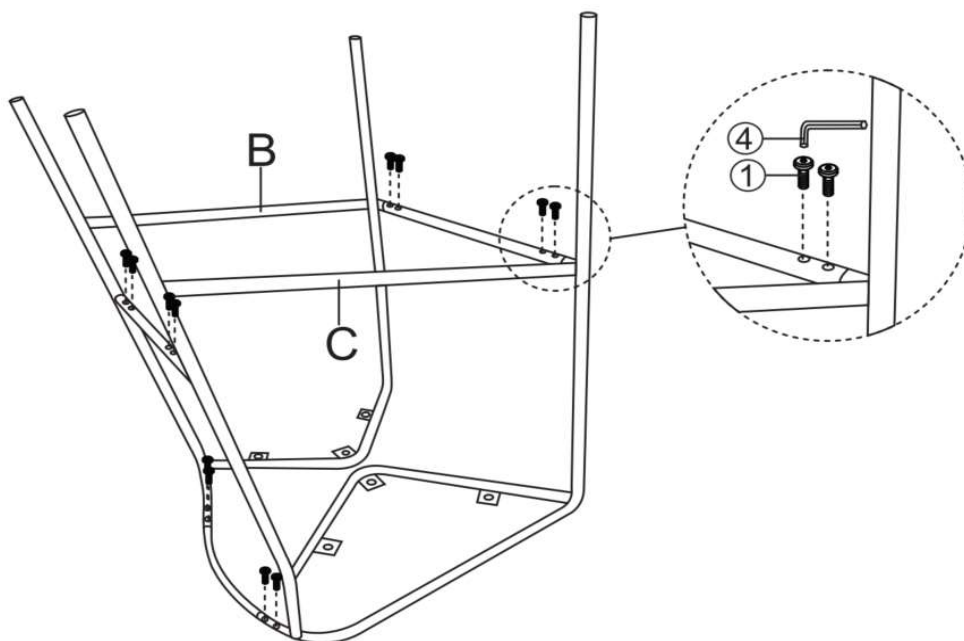
Step 1



Open the carton, place all parts on a clean and non-marring surface.

Insert the Short Foot Pedal (D), Back Connection (E) and Long Foot Pedal (F) into the Right Leg Frame (C) as shown above.

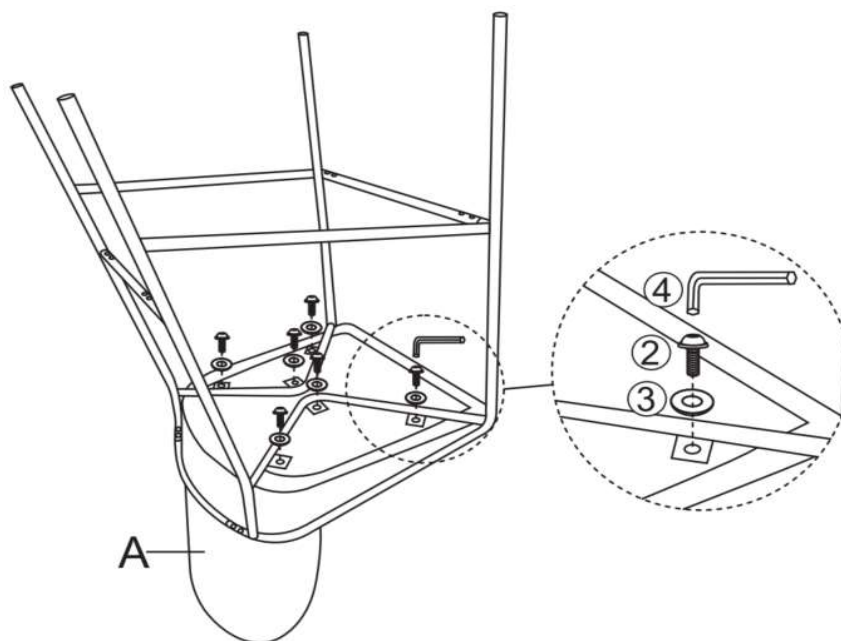
Step 2



Attach the Short Foot Pedal (D), Back Connection (E) and Long Foot Pedal (F) to the Left Leg Frame (B) using Bolts (①) with Allen Wrench (④) as shown above.

Inspect the assembly and make sure all parts are adequately connected. Fully Tighten all the Bolts.

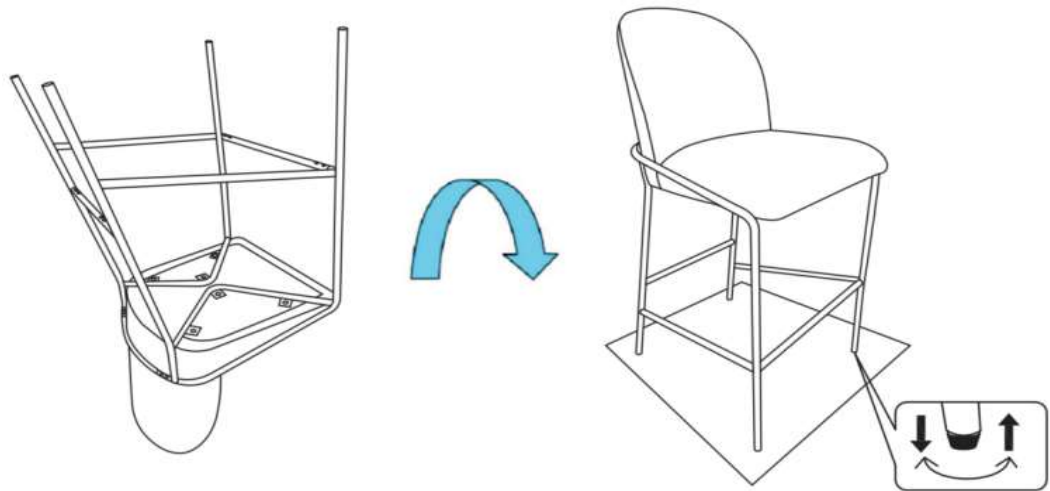
Step 3



Attach the Leg Frame from step 2 to the Seat Part (A) using Bolts (②) and Washers (③) with Allen Wrench (④) as shown above.

Fully Tighten all the Bolts.

Step 3



Stand the Bar Stool up.
Place the Bar Stool on a **LEVEL SURFACE** to check for wobbling.
Adjust the levelers on the legs to ensure bar stool stability

Step 4



Your Bar Stool is ready for use.
The Bar Stool can only be used on a flat, level surface.

Questions & Answers about Proposition 65

- What is Proposition 65?

Proposition 65 requires businesses to provide warnings to Californians about significant exposures to chemicals that cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. These chemicals can be in the products that Californians purchase, in their homes or workplaces, or that are released into the environment. By requiring that this information be provided, Proposition 65 enables Californians to make informed decisions about their exposures to these chemicals. Proposition 65 also prohibits California businesses from knowingly discharging significant amounts of listed chemicals into sources of drinking water.

Proposition 65 requires California to publish a list of chemicals known to cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. This list, which must be updated at least once a year, has grown to include approximately 900 chemicals since it was first published in 1987.

- What types of chemicals are on the Proposition 65 list?

The list contains a wide range of naturally occurring and synthetic chemicals that include additives or ingredients in pesticides, common household products, food, drugs, dyes, or solvents. Listed chemicals may also be used in manufacturing and construction, or they may be byproducts of chemical processes, such as motor vehicle exhaust.

- What does a warning mean?

If a warning is placed on a product label or posted or distributed at a workplace, a business, or in rental housing, the business issuing the warning is aware or believes that it is exposing individuals to one or more listed chemicals.

By law, a warning must be given for listed chemicals unless the exposure is low enough to pose no significant risk of cancer or is significantly below levels observed to cause birth defects or other reproductive harm.
