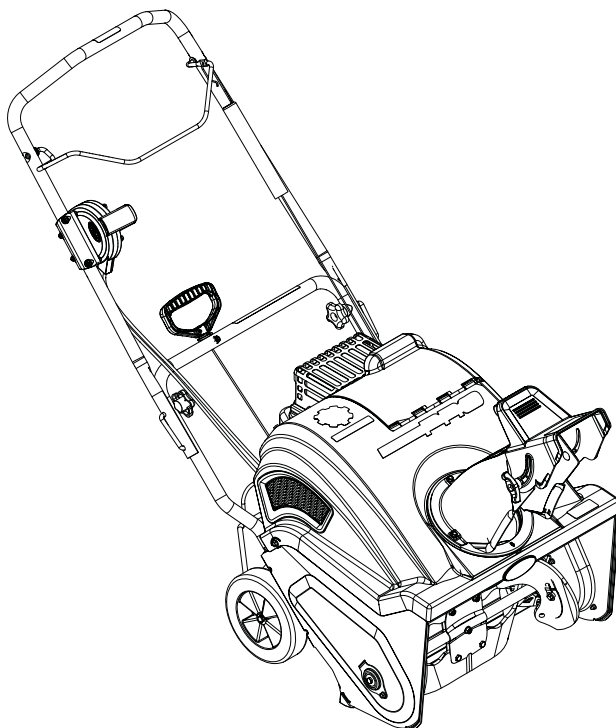

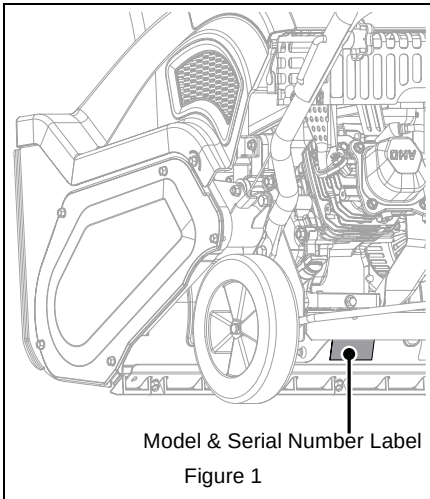

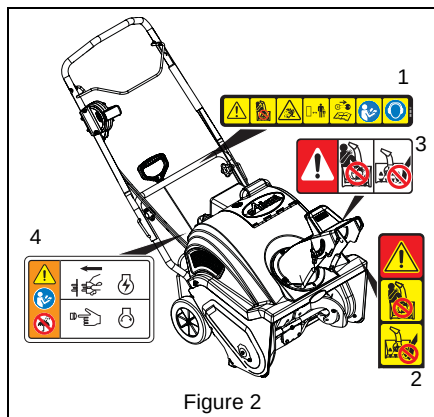

Safety Decal Descriptions

1. DANGER!

Only use clean-out tool to clear blockages. NEVER use your hands.



NEVER direct discharge towards persons or property that may be injured or damaged by thrown objects.



Keep people away from unit while operating. Keep children out of work area and under watchful care of a responsible adult.



Stop engine, remove key, and read manual before making any repairs or adjustments.

ROTATING PARTS.

Keep clear of auger while engine is running.



- Read Operator's Manual.
- Allow operation only by properly trained adult, never children.
- Stop engine and remove ignition key prior to leaving the operator's position for any reason.
- Keep all controls, guards and safety devices properly serviced and functional.
- Never direct discharge towards persons or property that may be injured or damaged by thrown objects.

ROTATING PARTS! ONLY use clean-out tool to clear blockages. **NEVER** use your hands. High speed auger/impeller rotates below discharge opening. Wait for all moving parts to stop before removing clogs or servicing.



Keep the area of operation clear of all persons, particularly small children. Keep children under watchful care of a responsible adult. Be alert and shut off unit if children enter area.

Exercise caution to avoid slipping or falling, especially when operating the snow thrower in reverse.

Always remove key and/or wire from spark plug before assembly, maintenance or service. Unintentional engine start up can cause death or serious injury.

Complete a walk-around inspection of the unit to understand the unit, your work area, and all safety decals.

Preparation

Always check overhead and side clearances carefully before operation.

Always be aware of traffic when operating along streets or curbs.

Thoroughly inspect the area where the equipment is to be used and remove all pets, doormats, sleds, boards, toys, wires, debris and other foreign objects.

Disengage all clutches and shift into neutral before starting the engine (motor).

Use only approved extension cords and receptacles when starting units equipped with electric starter. Do not connect electric starter cord to any wiring system that is not a three-wire grounded system.

SAFETY RULES

The following safety instructions are based on the B71.3 specifications of the American National Standards Institute in effect at the time of production.

Training

Read, understand and follow all instructions on the machine and in the manual(s) before operating this unit. Be thoroughly familiar with the controls and the proper use of the equipment. Know how to stop the unit and disengage the controls quickly.

Never allow children to operate the equipment. Never allow adults to operate the equipment without proper instruction, including actual operation.

Handle fuel with care; it is highly flammable. • Use an approved fuel container. • Never add fuel to a running engine or hot engine. • Fill fuel tank outdoors with extreme care. Never fill fuel tank indoors. • Never fill containers inside a vehicle or on a truck or trailer bed with a plastic liner. Always place containers on the ground, away from your vehicle, before filling. • When practical, remove gas-powered equipment from the truck or trailer and refuel it on the ground. If this is not possible, then refuel such equipment on a trailer with a portable container, rather than from a gasoline dispenser nozzle. • Keep the nozzle in contact with the rim of the fuel tank or container opening at all times, until refueling is complete. Do not use a nozzle lock-open device. • Replace gasoline cap securely and wipe up spilled fuel. • If fuel is spilled on clothing, change clothing immediately.	Thrown objects can cause injury. Check for weak spots on docks, ramps or floors. Avoid uneven work areas and rough terrain. Stay alert for hidden hazards.
Adjust the auger/impeller housing height to clear gravel or crushed rock surface.	Exercise extreme caution when operating on or crossing gravel drives, walks or roads. Adjust skid shoes so scraper blade does not contact gravel. Stay alert for hidden hazards or traffic.
Never attempt to make any adjustments while the engine (motor) is running (except when specifically recommended by manufacturer).	After striking a foreign object, stop the engine (motor), remove the wire from the spark plug, thoroughly inspect the snow thrower for any damage, and repair the damage before restarting and operating the snow thrower.
Always allow unit and engine to adjust to outdoor temperature before clearing snow.	If the unit should start to vibrate abnormally, stop the engine (motor) and check immediately for the cause.
Operation	Stop the engine (motor) whenever you leave the operating position, before unclogging the auger/impeller housing or discharge guide, and when making any repairs, adjustments or inspections.
Never leave a running unit unattended. Always shut off engine before leaving unit. Always remove key to prevent unauthorized use.	When leaving the machine unattended, disengage the power take-off, lower the attachment, set the parking brake, stop the engine and remove the key.
Do not put hands or feet near or under rotating parts. Keep clear of the discharge opening at all times.	When cleaning, repairing or inspecting the snow thrower, make certain the auger/impeller and all moving parts have stopped. Disconnect the spark plug wire and keep the wire away from the plug to prevent someone from accidentally starting the machine.
Moving and/or rotating parts can cut off body parts such as fingers or a hand. Always keep hands, feet and clothing away from all rotating parts during operation.	Do not run the engine (motor) indoors, except when starting the engine and for transporting the snow thrower in or out of the building. Open the outside doors; exhaust fumes are dangerous.
Always keep hands away from all pinch points.	Never operate the snow thrower without proper guards and other safety protective devices in place.
Do not touch unit parts which might be hot from operation. Allow parts to cool before attempting to maintain, adjust or service.	Never direct the discharge toward people or areas where property damage can occur from thrown objects. Keep children and others away.
	Do not overload the machine capacity by attempting to clear snow at too fast a rate. Slow down and turn corners slowly.
	Never operate the machine at high transport speeds on slippery surfaces. Look behind and use care when backing.
	Do not operate in reverse unless absolutely necessary. Always back up slowly and look down and behind before and while backing.

Do not carry passengers.	Before cleaning, removing clogs or making any inspections, repairs, etc., disengage clutch(es), stop unit and engine, remove key, allow moving parts to stop. Allow hot parts to cool.
Disengage attachment drive when traveling from one work area to another.	Make sure the equipment is in safe working condition. Check shear bolts and other bolts and hardware at frequent intervals for proper tightness. If components are worn or damaged, replace with manufacturer's recommended parts.
Disengage power to the auger/impeller when snow thrower is transported or not in use.	Check clutch and brake operation frequently.
Use only attachments and accessories approved by the manufacturer of the snow thrower (such as wheel weights, counterweights or cabs).	Do not change engine governor settings or over-speed engine.
This product is equipped with an internal combustion type engine. Do not use unit on or near any unimproved, forest-covered or brush-covered land unless exhaust system is equipped with a spark arrester meeting applicable local, state or federal laws. A spark arrester, if it is used, must be maintained in effective working order by operator.	Adjust and service as required. All motion of drive wheels and auger/impeller must stop quickly when control levers are released.
Never operate the snow thrower without good visibility or light. Falling snow, fog, etc. can reduce vision and cause an accident.	Always maintain unit in safe operating condition. Damaged or worn out muffler can cause fire or explosion.
Never operate unit after or during the use of medication, drugs or alcohol. Safe operation requires complete and unimpaired attention at all times.	Keep unit free of ice or other debris. Clean up oil or fuel spills.
Never allow anyone to operate this unit when their alertness or coordination is impaired.	Always keep protective structures, guards, and panels in good repair, in place and securely fastened. Never modify or remove safety devices.
Avoid sharp edges. Sharp edges can cut.	Never store the machine with fuel in the fuel tank inside a building where ignition sources are present such as hot water heaters, space heaters or clothes dryers. Allow the engine to cool before storing in any enclosure or covering the unit.
Do not throw snow any higher than necessary.	Always refer to operator's manual for important details if the snow thrower is to be stored for an extended period.
Clearing a Clogged Discharge Chute	Maintain or replace safety and instruction labels as necessary.
Hand contact with the rotating auger/impeller inside the discharge chute is the most common cause of injury associated with snow throwers. Never use your hand to clean out the discharge chute.	Run the machine a few minutes after throwing snow to prevent freeze-up of the auger/impeller.
To clear the chute: 1.SHUT THE ENGINE OFF! 2.Wait 10 seconds to be sure the auger/impeller blades have stopped rotating. 3.Always use a clean-out tool, not your hands.	Personal Protection
Maintenance and Storage	Do not operate the equipment without wearing adequate winter garments. Avoid loose fitting clothing that can get caught in moving parts. Wear footwear that will improve footing on slippery surfaces.
Secure unit so it will not tip over during maintenance.	Wear adequate safety gear, including safety glasses with side shields, and protective gloves.

Do not wear loose clothing or jewelry, and tie back hair that may get caught in rotating parts.	Keep the nozzle in contact with the rim of the fuel tank or container opening at all times until fueling is complete. Do not use a nozzle lock-open device.
Protect eyes, face and head from objects that may be thrown from unit. Wear appropriate hearing protection.	If fuel is spilled on clothing, change clothing immediately.
	Properly remove fuel before tipping unit up onto housing, so no spills will occur.
Slope Operation	Towing/Transporting
Operate the snow thrower on level surfaces. Stay off slopes and slippery surfaces.	Always shut off engine, remove key and close fuel shut-off valve or drain fuel when transporting unit on a truck or trailer.
Do not clear snow across the face of slopes; go up and down. Exercise extreme caution when operating on slopes. Do not attempt to clear steep slopes.	Use extra care when loading or unloading unit onto trailer or truck. Secure unit chassis to transport vehicle. Never secure from rods or linkages that could be damaged. Do not transport machine while engine is running.
Use a slow speed to avoid stops or shifts on slopes. Avoid starting or stopping on a slope.	
Do not park unit on a slope unless absolutely necessary. When parking on a slope always block the wheels.	Accessories
Do not operate near drop-offs, ditches, or embankments. Unit can suddenly turn over if a wheel is over the edge of a cliff or ditch, or if an edge caves in.	Use only Ariens Company-recommended attachments that are appropriate to your use and can be used safely in your application.
Fuel	
Do not run engine in an enclosed area. Always provide good ventilation. Fumes from engine exhaust can cause injury or death.	
Fuel is highly flammable and its vapors are explosive. Handle with care. Use only an approved gasoline container with an appropriately sized dispensing spout.	
No smoking, No sparks, No flames. Always allow engine to cool before servicing.	
Never fill fuel tank when engine is running or hot from operation.	
Never fill or drain fuel tank indoors.	
Replace fuel cap securely and clean up spilled fuel.	
Never fill fuel containers inside a vehicle or on a truck or trailer bed with a plastic liner. Always place containers on the ground away from your vehicle before filling.	
When practical, remove gas-powered equipment from the truck or trailer and refuel it on the ground. If this is not possible, then refuel on a trailer with a portable container, rather than from a gasoline dispenser nozzle.

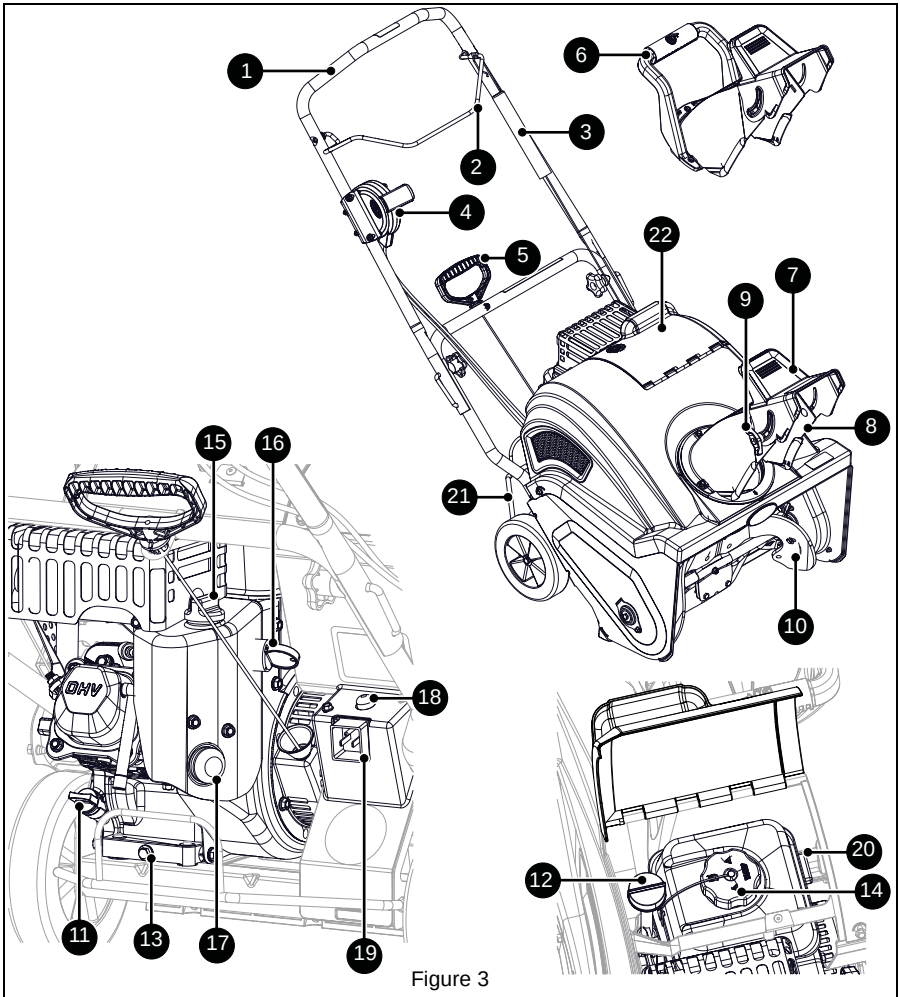

ENGINE SWITCH

See Figure 4.

The engine switch has two positions:

- Off – Engine will not start or run.
- On – Engine will start and run.

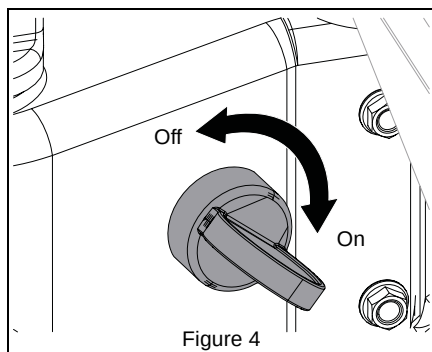

CHOKE CONTROL KNOB

See Figure 5.

- Start – (Choke Closed): Chokes off air to engine for easier starting.
- Run – (Choke Open): Allows for normal operation.

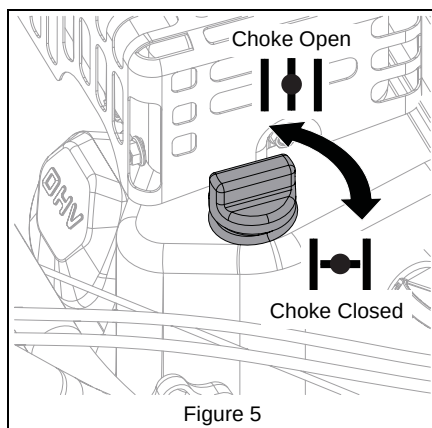

FUEL VALVE

See Figure 6.

Controls fuel flow to the engine. The fuel valve has two positions:

- Closed – Use this position to service, transport or store the unit.
- Open – Use this position to run the unit.

NOTICE: The valve is closed when it is narrow and vertical when viewed from above.

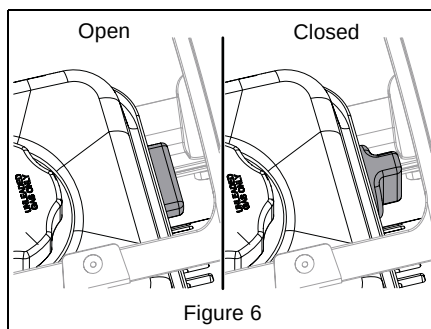

PRIMER BULB

Adds fuel to engine for easier start on cold engines. See *Start Engine* on page 10.

RECOIL STARTER HANDLE

When pulled, handle will start engine. See *Start Engine* on page 10.

ELECTRIC START BUTTON

Models 938032, 938033, 938034

When pushed, button will start a properly choked and cranked engine. See *Start Engine* on page 10.

DISCHARGE CHUTE HANDLE

Models 938030, 938031, 938032, 938034

Turn discharge chute handle to control direction of snow discharge. See *Position Discharge Chute* on page 11.

REMOTE DISCHARGE CHUTE HANDLE ASSEMBLY

Model 938033

See Figure 7.

Move remote discharge chute handle forward or backward to control direction of snow discharge.

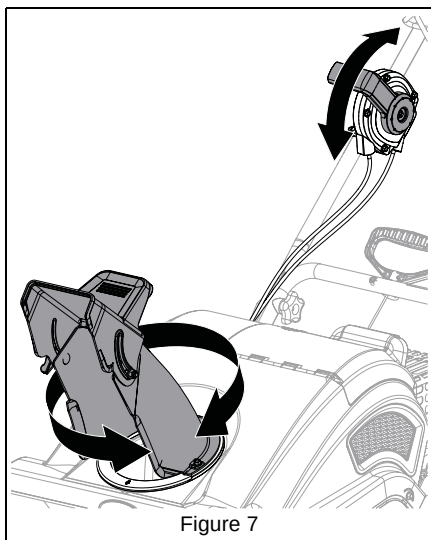

BEFORE OPERATING



WARNING: AVOID INJURY. Read and understand the *Safety* section before proceeding.

IMPORTANT: All references to left, right, front or rear are given from the perspective of operator in operator's position, facing the direction of forward travel.

1. Know how to stop in an emergency. See *Emergency Stopping* on page 10.
2. Check for frozen components.
3. Check fuel level and add fuel if needed.

IMPORTANT: Use fresh unleaded fuel with an octane rating of at least 87. DO NOT use E85 blended fuels; the engine is not E20 / E30 / E85 compatible. The maximum recommended ethanol content is 10%. Ariens recommends using a quality fuel stabilizer in all fuel. See *Short Term* on page 17.

4. Check engine oil level and add oil if needed. Refer to engine manual.
5. Check function of all controls.

CHECK ENGINE OIL

Models 938031, 938032, 938033

1. Stop engine, remove key and close fuel valve.
2. Open fuel and oil door and remove cap from oil fill.

3. Check engine oil level and add oil if needed. Refer to engine manual.
4. Replace cap and close door.
5. Clean up any spilled oil.

Models 938030, 938034

1. Stop engine, remove key and close fuel valve.
2. Remove cap from oil fill.
3. Check engine oil level and add oil if needed. Refer to engine manual.
4. Replace cap.
5. Clean up any spilled oil.

OPERATION



WARNING: AVOID INJURY. Read and understand the *Safety* section before proceeding.

EMERGENCY STOPPING

1. Release auger control bar.
2. Turn engine switch to OFF position.
3. Wait for all moving parts to stop before leaving operator's position.

START ENGINE

1. Position discharge chute in a safe direction. See *Position Discharge Chute* on page 11.
2. Move engine switch to ON position.
3. *Electric Start Models Only:* Connect a power cord to power cord receptacle and then plug cord into a wall outlet.



CAUTION: Use cord that is minimum of 13 amp, 16 Gauge, 3 wire grounded plug, UL listed, CSA Certified. Cord must be labeled suitable for outdoor use.

4. Open fuel valve.
5. If engine is cold, turn choke to CLOSED position.

IMPORTANT: Do not apply choke to a warm engine.

6. Push primer bulb twice.

IMPORTANT: Do not push primer bulb to start a warm engine.

7. *Electric Start Models Only:* Press electric start button. If engine does not start after three attempts, see *Troubleshooting* on page 18.

8. *Electric Start Models Only:* When engine starts, disconnect power cord from wall outlet, then disconnect cord from power cord receptacle.
9. *Recoil Start:* Pull recoil starter handle.
 - a. Grasp handle and pull rope out slowly until it pulls harder.
 - b. Pull handle firmly and quickly with a rapid, continuous full-arm stroke. Repeat until engine starts. If engine does not start, see *Troubleshooting* on page 18.
 - c. Let handle rewind slowly after engine starts. DO NOT let handle snap back against handlebar.
10. Gradually open choke after engine starts.

POSITION DISCHARGE CHUTE

See Figure 8.

IMPORTANT: Always throw snow in a safe direction, away from people and windows.

IMPORTANT: If chute becomes frozen and does not turn correctly, take unit into warm area until controls are unfrozen.

Model 938033:

1. Move remote discharge chute handle forward or backward to choose the direction to throw snow.
2. Loosen wing knob and move discharge chute deflector handle up or down to control snow throw height.
3. Tighten wing knob.

Models 938030, 938031, 938032, 938034:

1. Turn discharge chute handle in the direction you want to throw snow.
2. Loosen wing knob and move discharge chute deflector handle up or down to control snow throw height.
3. Tighten wing knob.

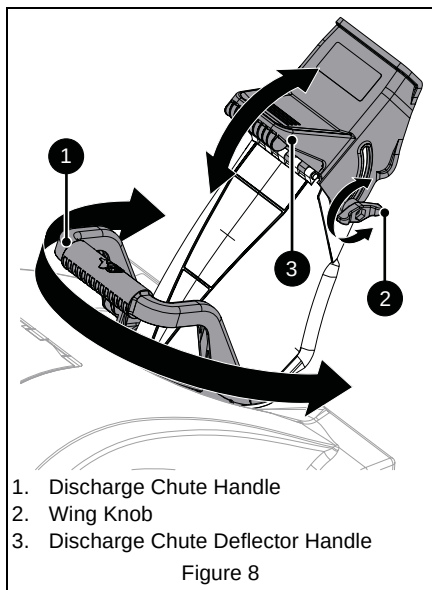


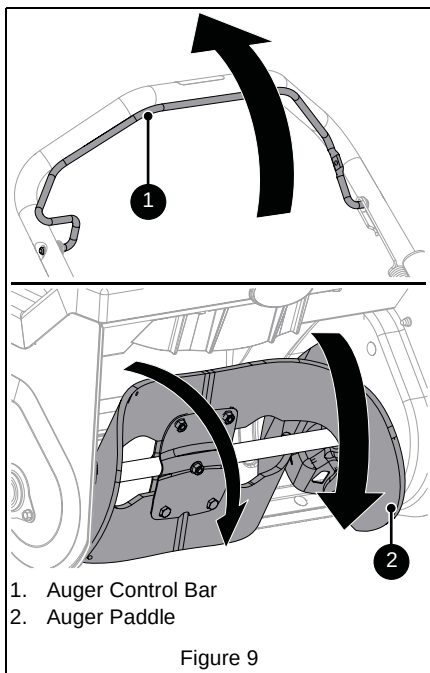

OPERATE UNIT

1. Rotate discharge chute and move deflector to desired positions.

NOTICE: On some surfaces, auger paddle rotation may leave residual paddle material. This usually washes off after rain showers. Scraper bar may be adjusted to minimize this condition. See *Adjust Scraper Blade* on page 15.

2. Pull auger control bar back to handlebar to start auger; release bar to stop auger. See Figure 9.

STOP ENGINE

1. Release auger control bar.
2. Turn engine switch to OFF position.
3. Close fuel valve.

TRANSPORTING UNIT

1. Stop engine, remove key and close fuel valve.

NOTICE: Use extra care when loading or unloading onto truck or trailer. DO NOT lift using discharge chute handle.

2. Secure unit chassis to transport vehicle. Never secure from rods or linkages that could be damaged.

FOR BEST PERFORMANCE

- For complete snow removal, walk slowly and slightly overlap each path previously taken.
- Position discharge chute downwind when possible.
- Do not pick up gravel and rocks. Push down slightly on handlebar to avoid picking up debris.
- Inspect auger before each use and remove any accumulation / debris.
- Check oil level before each use.
- Clean unit after each use.

MAINTENANCE



WARNING: AVOID INJURY. Read and understand the *Safety* section before proceeding.

Proper maintenance can prolong the life of unit. The *Maintenance Schedule* on Page 12 shows the recommended service schedule.

Your Ariens dealer can provide service and adjustments to keep your unit operating at peak efficiency. Contact an authorized engine manufacturer's service center for engine service.

More frequent service may be required due to working conditions (heavy loads, high ambient temperatures, dusty conditions, or airborne debris).

CLEAN UNIT

1. Remove snow and debris with a soft-bristled brush. DO NOT use harsh abrasives or cleaners.
2. Protect painted surfaces with automotive-type wax.

CHECK ENGINE OIL

See *Check Engine Oil* on page 10.

CHANGE ENGINE OIL

Refer to engine manual.

CHECK FASTENERS

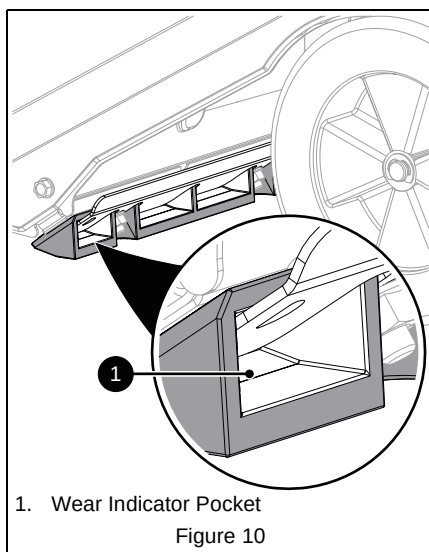
Check for loose hardware.

CHECK AUGER PADDLE WEAR

Replace when auger paddles have worn through wear indicator holes. See *Replace Auger Paddles* on page 13.

CHECK SCRAPER BLADE WEAR

Replace when damaged or when scraper blade has been adjusted down as far as possible and does not touch surface or clear properly. Scraper blade **MUST** be replaced when worn through to wear indicator pockets. See Figure 10.



NOTICE: DO NOT allow scraper blade to wear down too far or auger housing will become damaged. See *Replace Scraper Blade* on page 15.

CHECK BELT WEAR

Adjust auger cable as needed. Replace when damaged or when auger stops or stutters during operation. See *Adjust Auger Cable* on page 14 and *Replace Belt* on Page 15.

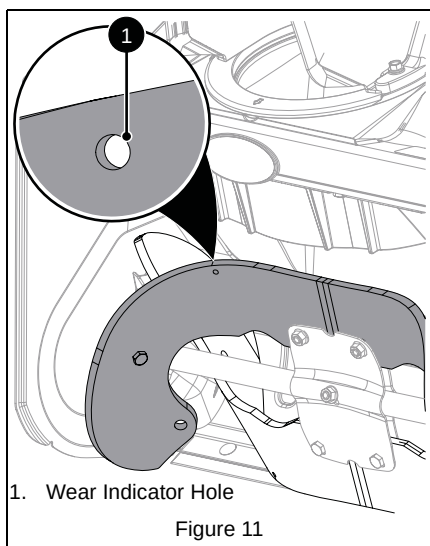

REPLACE AUGER PADDLES

Replace auger paddles when paddles have worn completely through wear indicator holes. See Figure 11.

IMPORTANT: Always replace auger paddles in pairs. Do not replace one paddle only.



1. Wear Indicator Hole

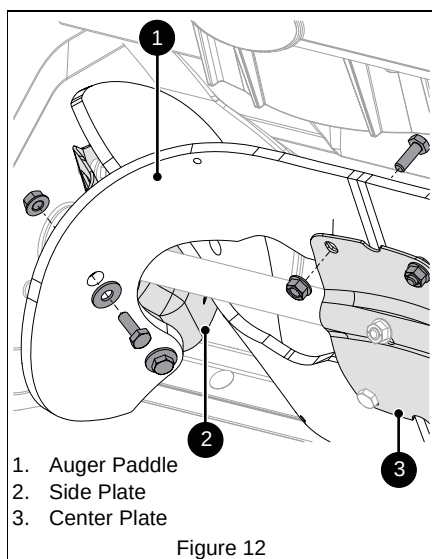

1. Stop engine, remove key and close fuel valve. Allow unit to cool.

2. Tip unit back onto engine guard. **DO NOT** tip further than engine guard allows or oil may leak out of engine.
3. Remove six hex bolts, washers and top locking flange nuts securing each paddle to center plate and side plates. Discard all parts.

3. Center Plate

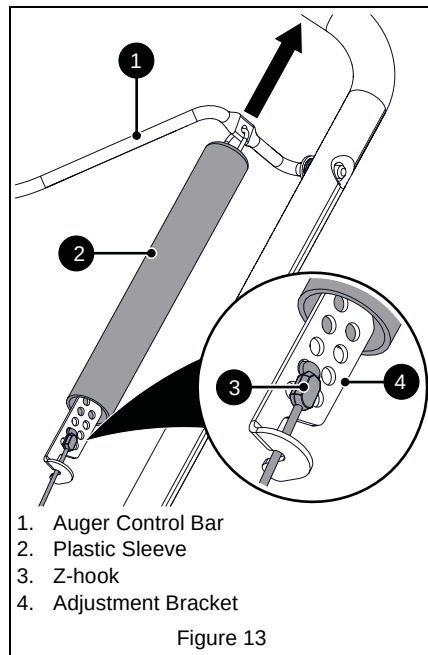

4. Position new paddles with wear indicator holes on the left side as you face the unit.
5. Install spacers into paddle holes and secure paddle with new hex bolts and nuts.
6. Tighten nuts to 5.6 – 10.2 N•m (50 – 90 lb-in). **DO NOT** overtighten.
7. When both paddles are installed, rotate auger paddles by hand. Ensure that paddles do not rub on housing and are tightly attached.
8. Return unit to operating position.
9. Remove slack from auger cable. See *Adjust Auger Cable* on page 14.

ADJUST AUGER CABLE

1. Stop engine, remove key and close fuel valve.
2. Slide plastic sleeve up to auger control bar.
3. Insert Z-hook into appropriate hole in adjustment bracket. When auger control bar is disengaged, there should be minor slack in cable and no tension.
4. Engage auger control bar to ensure proper operation. There should be no excessive tension on cable.
5. Lower plastic sleeve.

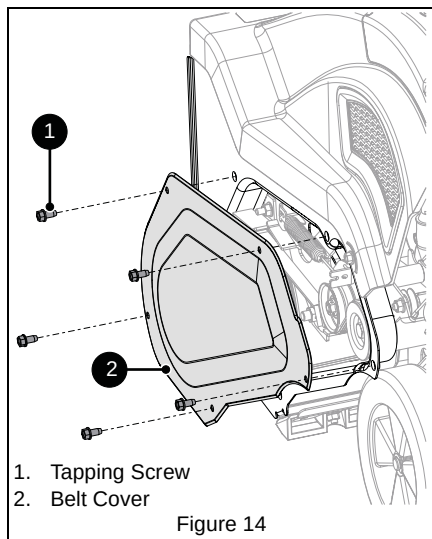


1. Auger Control Bar

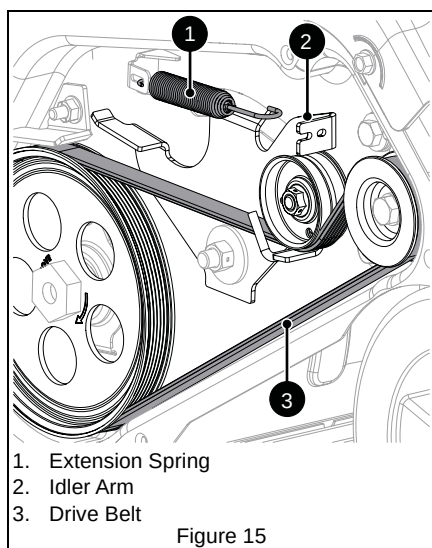
REPLACE BELT

1. Stop engine, remove key and close fuel valve. Allow unit to cool.
2. Remove five tapping screws from belt cover and remove belt cover. Retain all parts. See Figure 14.

3. Disconnect extension spring from idler arm.
4. Remove belt from drive pulley, idler and engine sheave.



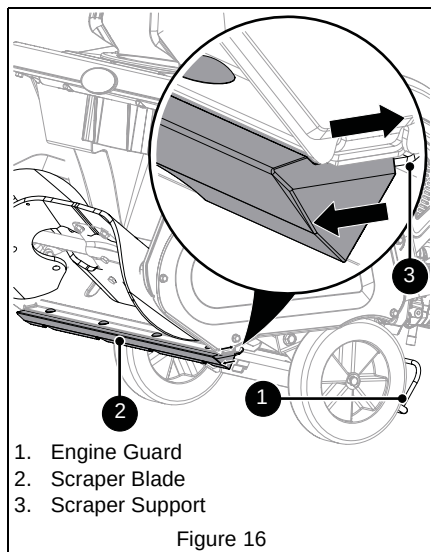
5. Install new belt on engine sheave, idler and drive pulley. Route belt between idler and belt finger on idler arm.
6. Reinstall extension spring.
7. Reinstall belt cover.

ADJUST SCRAPER BLADE

IMPORTANT: The auger housing may be damaged if blade wears down too much.

1. Tip unit back onto engine guard and loosen hardware securing scraper blade to scraper support.
2. Reposition scraper blade.
 - Move scraper blade down to compensate for scraper blade wear and increase auger clearance.
 - Move scraper blade up to decrease auger clearance.
3. Tighten hardware and return unit to operating position.



REPLACE SCRAPER BLADE

1. Stop engine, remove key and close fuel valve. Allow unit to cool.

2. Tip unit back onto engine guard.

3. Remove nuts, bolts, scraper support and scraper blade. Retain hardware. Discard scraper blade.

4. Check condition of scraper support. Replace if worn or damaged.

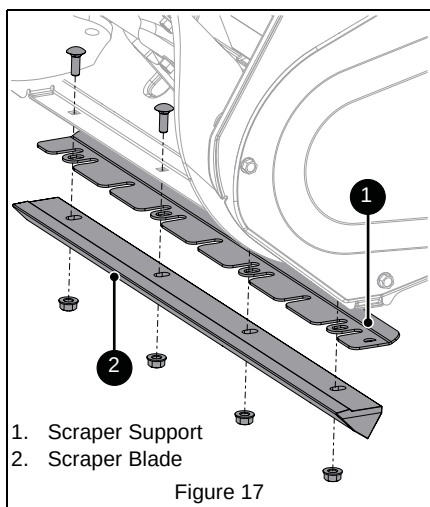

 - Scraper assembly bolt holes must align with square bolt holes in auger housing.

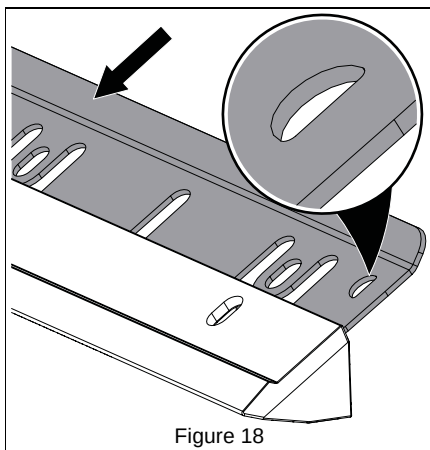

7. Move scraper assembly backward and up until small lip on top of scraper blade contacts bottom lip of housing.
8. Install bolts and nuts. Tighten nuts to 4.5 – 5.7 N•m (40 – 50 lb-in). Threads must protrude beyond the nut.
9. Return unit to operating position.

IMPORTANT: If auger paddles are pulling too strongly or scraper blade is not clearing completely, loosen nuts (do not remove) and slide scraper assembly down slightly. Tighten nuts.

ADJUST REMOTE CHUTE ROTATION CABLES

1. Stop engine, remove key and close fuel valve. Allow unit to cool.

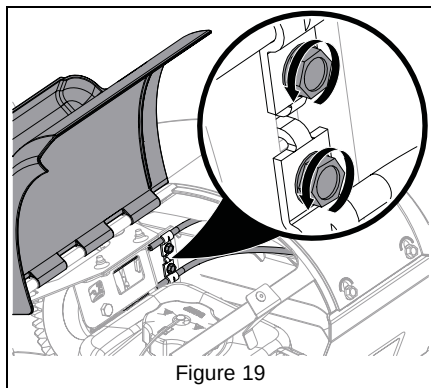

STORAGE



WARNING: AVOID INJURY. Read and understand the *Safety* section before proceeding.

SHORT TERM

1. Engage auger momentarily to remove loose or melting snow to prevent auger shaft from freezing.
2. Tighten all hardware to correct specifications.
3. Inspect unit for visible signs of wear or damage. Repair as needed.
4. Apply a light layer of oil or anti-rust compound on bare metal areas.
5. Prepare fuel system for storage.

NOTICE: Ariens recommends using a quality fuel stabilizer in all fuel. Gasoline left in the fuel system without a stabilizer, even for short periods of time, deteriorates and leaves gummy deposits in the system that may damage the carburetor and fuel hoses, filter and tank. For the best effectiveness, add stabilizer to all fuel containers whenever purchasing fuel. Add the stabilizer to the container before adding fuel.

- a. Add Ariens fuel stabilizer (see *Service Parts* on page 12) or equivalent according to manufacturer's instructions to the fuel tank and any fuel containers with remaining fuel.
 - b. Run engine outdoors for at least 5 minutes to allow stabilizer to reach the carburetor.
6. Close fuel valve and allow engine to stop on its own.
 7. Set engine switch to off position and remove key.
 8. Store unit in a cool, dry, protected area. Do not store unit outdoors.

LONG TERM

1. Perform all short-term storage items.
2. Wash salt and other corrosive ice-melting agent residue from unit with mild soap and low-pressure water.

IMPORTANT: Never spray unit with high-pressure water.

3. Touch up all scratched painted surfaces.
4. Store unit in a cool, dry, protected area. Do not store unit outdoors.

START-OF-SEASON FUEL PREPARATION

1. Before opening the fuel valve for the first time after long-term storage, add fresh, stabilizer-treated fuel to the fuel tank and any fuel containers with remaining fuel.
